Maths



Children will be exploring the following this term:

- Number Place Value
- Number Addition & Subtraction
- Number Multiplication & Division
- Geometry 2D Shapes

English: In English, children will be reading 'Who Let the Gods Out' by Maz Evans. The children will be using this text during their daily reading sessions as well as using this as a stimulus for writing. The

writing genres that the children will be focussing on this term will be: fiction (quest story) and non-fiction: persuasive and formal


Geography

In geography this term, children will compare a region of the UK to a region of Europe Greece. During the topic, they will learn about similarities or differences in human and physical geography of regions, investigate coastal maps and develop an understanding of four figure grid references.

History

In history, the children will look at influences that the Ancient Greeks had on the Western world including democracy. The Olympics and architecture. The learning will develop their understanding of chronology (BC and BCE), focus on the validity of evidence sources and improve their historical vocabulary through class debates.

Children will be able to explain why being listened to and listening to others is important in the school community. They will also look at why being



democratic is important to help feel valued. Children will problem-solve and offer different solutions to help their team/ class/ school be more democratic.

The children will learn about kosher food choices, look at the story of passover and describe how choices of Jewish people can effect their everyday life choices.




